**CHAPTER THREE: THE APOSTOLICITY OF THE EUCHARIST
AND OF THE CHURCH**

The sacramental incompleteness of these celebrations should above all inspire the whole community to pray with greater fervour that the Lord will send labourers into his harvest (cf. Mt 9:38). It should also be an incentive to mobilize all the resources needed for an adequate pastoral promotion of vocations, without yielding to the temptation to seek solutions which lower the moral and formative standards demanded of candidates for the priesthood.

33. When, due to the scarcity of priests, non-ordained members of the faithful are entrusted with a share in the pastoral care of a parish, they should bear in mind that – as the Second Vatican Council teaches – “no Christian community can be built up unless it has its basis and centre in the celebration of the most Holy Eucharist”.⁶⁶ They have a responsibility, therefore, to keep alive in the community a genuine “hunger” for the Eucharist, so that no opportunity for the celebration of Mass will ever be missed, also taking advantage of the occasional presence of a priest who is not impeded by Church law from celebrating Mass.

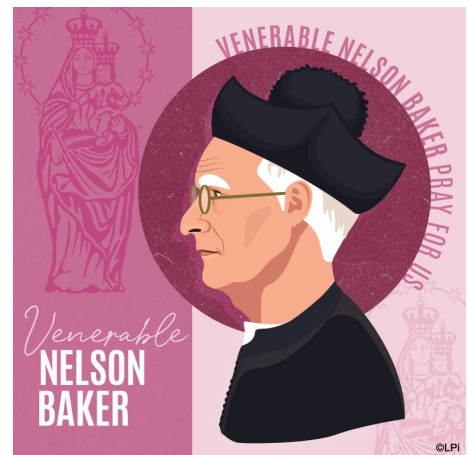

Born February 16, 1842, in New York, his home community of Buffalo would eventually name Fr. Nelson Baker "Buffalo's most influential citizen of the 20th century." Before being ordained a priest, Baker served in the Civil War as a Union soldier. Following his time as a soldier, Baker joined the St. Vincent De Paul Society. He entered Our Lady of Angels Seminary on September 2, 1869, and was ordained on March 19, 1876. [His] devotion to Our Lady of Victory inspired him to begin The Association of Our Lady of Victory. Catholics everywhere joined the Association of Our Lady of Victory with their twenty-five cent annual membership dues. Father Baker's community of faithful financial supporters continued to help him build resources for those in need. He tripled the number of children in his orphanages, built a home for unwed mothers, began a maternity hospital that eventually became a full-service hospital, built a debt-free church for worship and gathering nearby and more! His vision became a safe location for destitute people to come and be cared for. Once the Great Depression hit, it is estimated that 500,000 people were fed at his church. In his 90's, he shifted focus to the service and education of black Americans traveling north for work and opportunity. Following his death on July 29, 1936, 500,000 people visited to pay their respects before his funeral. Father Baker was declared Venerable in 2011 and is still awaiting sainthood.

SAINT VS. BLESSED

Question:

What is the difference between a "Saint" and a "Blessed"?

Answer:

The process of proclaiming someone as a saint in the Catholic Church has evolved over the course of many centuries. In the beginning, those honored as saints were almost exclusively biblical figures or martyrs. However, after the legalization of Christianity in the fourth century, new holy women and men came to be honored as saints, and this was often done by popular acclaim or by the local bishop or abbot. It was Pope Gregory IX (who was pope from 1227 to 1241) who officially proclaimed that only the pope had the authority to add someone to the official list (the "canon") of saints. This is the meaning of the word "canonization." Today, the saint-making process includes several steps, including detailed studies of the person's life and a recognition that they died as a martyr or lived a life of "heroic virtue." Once someone is recognized as a martyr or if a miracle is attributed to their intercession, they will be beatified and honored as "Blessed." This means that they can be celebrated by Catholics in a particular country or region or by the members of certain religious community. If another miracle occurs and is approved, then the "Blessed" is canonized and honored with the title "Saint," meaning that they are now officially recognized as a universal model of holiness and an intercessor.

CHAPTER TWO THE SACRAMENTAL CELEBRATION OF THE PASCHAL MYSTERY

Article 2 LITURGICAL DIVERSITY AND THE UNITY OF THE MYSTERY

Liturgical traditions and the catholicity of the Church

1201 The mystery of Christ is so unfathomably rich that it cannot be exhausted by its expression in any single liturgical tradition. the history of the blossoming and development of these rites witnesses to a remarkable complementarity. When the Churches lived their respective liturgical traditions in the communion of the faith and the sacraments of the faith, they enriched one another and grew in fidelity to Tradition and to the common mission of the whole Church.⁶⁶

1202 The diverse liturgical traditions have arisen by very reason of the Church's mission. Churches of the same geographical and cultural area came to celebrate the mystery of Christ through particular expressions characterized by the culture: in the tradition of the "deposit of faith,"⁶⁷ in liturgical symbolism, in the organization of fraternal communion, in the theological understanding of the mysteries, and in various forms of holiness. Through the liturgical life of a local church, Christ, the light and salvation of all peoples, is made manifest to the particular people and culture to which that Church is sent and in which she is rooted. the Church is catholic, capable of integrating into her unity, while purifying them, all the authentic riches of cultures.⁶⁸

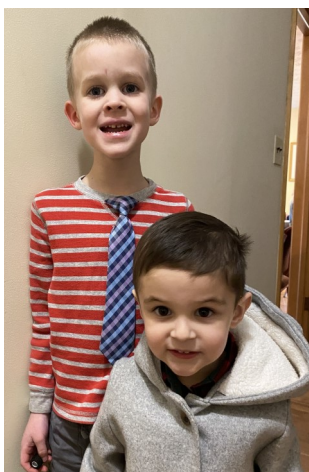

MEDITACIÓN DEL EVANGELIO

Mt 5, 1-12

La sociedad actual tiene una necesidad imperante de buscar la comodidad, la riqueza, la fama y el poder. Sin embargo, el Evangelio de hoy narra las bienaventuranzas y la primera de ellas invita a la pobreza: “Felices los que tienen espíritu del pobre, porque de ellos es el Reino de los cielos” (Mateo 5,3). Al contrario de esta bienaventuranza, los anuncios en los medios de comunicación son de comodidad y riqueza. Estos no se llevan con la pobreza de espíritu, mucho menos con la Buena Nueva del Evangelio, donde Dios anuncia la salvación a los pobres y va con los pobres.

El sermón del monte declara solemnemente el anuncio de la Buena Nueva a los pobres y necesitados. Esto no quiere decir que se esté contra los ricos, por el contrario, compartir los bienes recibidos dan más abundancia. La solidaridad y misericordia de unos para con los otros es camino seguro para convertir un corazón duro y cerrado, en un corazón compasivo y dadivoso. Ser pobre de espíritu quiere decir confiar y abandonarse en Dios, aunque se tengan bienes materiales. La persona sencilla se somete a Dios confiando en su voluntad. Si analizamos a los santos y santas de Dios, ellos se caracterizan por ser pobres, justos y sencillos. ¿Cuál de las bienaventuranzas te ayuda a cambiar el corazón y te lleva a la conversión? ¿Conoces a alguien que sea pobre de espíritu y limpio de corazón? ¿Qué imitarías de esa persona? Ser felices, ser pobres, significa ser constructores de la paz, dejar la violencia y el egoísmo. ¿Podremos?

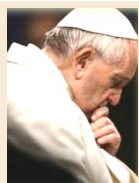

Capítulo III: No Matarás la Ley Santa de Dios

Mi embrión tus ojos lo veían » (Sal 139 138, 16): el delito abominable del aborto

Ante semejante unanimidad en la tradición doctrinal y disciplinar de la Iglesia, Pablo VI pudo declarar que esta enseñanza no había cambiado y que era inmutable.⁷² Por tanto, con la autoridad que Cristo confirió a Pedro y a sus Sucesores, en comunión con todos los Obispos —que en varias ocasiones han condenado el aborto y que en la consulta citada anteriormente, aunque dispersos por el mundo, han concordado unánimemente sobre esta doctrina—, declaro que el aborto directo, es decir, querido como fin o como medio, es siempre un desorden moral grave, en cuanto eliminación deliberada de un ser humano inocente. Esta doctrina se fundamenta en la ley natural y en la Palabra de Dios escrita; es transmitida por la Tradición de la Iglesia y enseñada por el Magisterio ordinario y universal.⁷³

Ninguna circunstancia, ninguna finalidad, ninguna ley del mundo podrá jamás hacer lícito un acto que es intrínsecamente ilícito, por ser contrario a la Ley de Dios, escrita en el corazón de cada hombre, reconocible por la misma razón, y proclamada por la Iglesia.
