





Easter is the principal feast of the ecclesiastical year. The connection between the Jewish Passover and the Christian feast of Easter is real and ideal. Real, since Christ died on the first Jewish Easter Day; ideal, like the relation between type and reality, because Christ's death and Resurrection had its figures and types in the Old Law, particularly in the paschal lamb. In fact, the Jewish feast was taken over into the Christian Easter celebration. Easter has no fixed date, like Christmas, because the 15th of Nisan of the Semitic calendar was shifting from date to date on the Julian calendar. Since Christ, the true Paschal Lamb, had been slain on the very day when the Jews, in celebration of their Passover, immolated the figurative lamb, the Jewish Christians in the Orient followed the Jewish method, and commemorated the death of Christ on the 15th of Nisan and His Resurrection on the 17th of Nisan, no matter on what day of the week they fell.

CHAPTER FOUR: THE EUCHARIST AND ECCLESIAL COMMUNION

I would like nonetheless to reaffirm what I said in my Encyclical Letter *Ut Unum Sint* after having acknowledged the impossibility of Eucharistic sharing: “And yet we do have a burning desire to join in celebrating the one Eucharist of the Lord, and this desire itself is already a common prayer of praise, a single supplication. Together we speak to the Father and increasingly we do so ‘with one heart’”.⁹⁴

45. While it is never legitimate to concelebrate in the absence of full communion, the same is not true with respect to the administration of the Eucharist under special circumstances, to individual persons belonging to Churches or Ecclesial Communities not in full communion with the Catholic Church. In this case, in fact, the intention is to meet a grave spiritual need for the eternal salvation of an individual believer, not to bring about an intercommunion which remains impossible until the visible bonds of ecclesial communion are fully re-established.

This was the approach taken by the Second Vatican Council when it gave guidelines for responding to Eastern Christians separated in good faith from the Catholic Church, who spontaneously ask to receive the Eucharist from a Catholic minister and are properly disposed.⁹⁵ This approach was then ratified by both Codes, which also consider – with necessary modifications – the case of other non-Eastern Christians who are not in full communion with the Catholic Church.⁹⁶

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

At Easter, we celebrate that our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, conquered death, rose from the dead, and remains very much alive. To the world of non-believers: what!? It is quite a big reality to swallow. But for the believer, it is a reality that inspires us to the point where we find ourselves constantly sharing the Gospel with everyone we meet! Right? So what does Easter mean to you? The question is not what do you believe. The question is what impact does Easter have on you? How do your actions demonstrate the power of Easter? What does it mean we you hear that we, the Church, are an Easter people? You may be saying right now that you have no intention of becoming an evangelist, passing out Bibles to all you meet. But I would like to suggest that you actually have a more powerful way of evangelizing others: everyday stewardship. Actions speak louder than words and the way you live your life can be a great testimony to all those you encounter. By acknowledging the gifts you have been given, cultivating those so they grow to an increase, and then sharing them fully with God and with others in God's name will give testimony to your belief that Jesus is alive and seeking a relationship with each of his people. If more of us won't live our lives in this manner, then non-believers and non-intentional disciples will ask the question, "What difference does Easter make anyway?" Jesus died and rose for you and me. To be sure, it DOES make a difference.

EASTER

Question:

Why does the date of Easter change every year, while most other celebrations are celebrated on the same day?

Answer:

Every feast is celebrated at a certain time for a reason. Saints feast days are commonly the day of their death. While we don't know Jesus' exact birthday, we celebrate the "light of the world" around the time of winter solstice, as dark, wintery days begin to lengthen again. We have a historical clue, however, to when the Easter events occurred. We know that Jesus was crucified the day before Passover. The Jews calculated the date for Passover based on both the solar and lunar calendars. It corresponds to the first full moon after the spring equinox. The early Christians maintained this connection in their celebrations of Easter on the first Sunday after the paschal full moon. We don't re-calculate the full moon every year. As astronomy developed, so too did the forecasts of when Easter would occur in future years. The Church has created a table of calculated dates, projecting the date of Easter decades in advance. The date of Easter also determines the date of Ash Wednesday and the season of Lent, as well as the feast days following in the Easter season, including Pentecost. So these feasts move, too! This tradition may seem complicated, but it connects our Christian faith now to what has come before — our Jewish roots and the real, historical reality of Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection.



Capítulo III: No Matarás la Ley Santa de Dios « Yo doy la muerte y doy la vida » (Dt 32, 39): el drama de la eutanasia

Ya Pío XII afirmó que es lícito suprimir el dolor por medio de narcóticos, a pesar de tener como consecuencia limitar la conciencia y abreviar la vida, « si no hay otros medios y si, en tales circunstancias, ello no impide el cumplimiento de otros deberes religiosos y morales ». ⁷⁹ En efecto, en este caso no se quiere ni se busca la muerte, aunque por motivos razonables se corra ese riesgo. Simplemente se pretende mitigar el dolor de manera eficaz, recurriendo a los analgésicos puestos a disposición por la medicina. Sin embargo, « no es lícito privar al moribundo de la conciencia propia sin grave motivo »: ⁸⁰ acercándose a la muerte, los hombres deben estar en condiciones de poder cumplir sus obligaciones morales y familiares y, sobre todo, deben poderse preparar con plena conciencia al encuentro definitivo con Dios. Hechas estas distinciones, de acuerdo con el Magisterio de mis Predecesores ⁸¹ y en comunión con los Obispos de la Iglesia católica, confirmo que la eutanasia es una grave violación de la Ley de Dios, en cuanto eliminación deliberada y moralmente inaceptable de una persona humana. Esta doctrina se fundamenta en la ley natural y en la Palabra de Dios escrita; es transmitida por la Tradición de la Iglesia y enseñada por el Magisterio ordinario y universal. ⁸² Semejante práctica conlleva, según las circunstancias, la malicia propia del suicidio o del homicidio.
